1. Call to order: Chair Watson called the meeting to order at 6:35 p.m.

c. RSU #38 Board Student Representatives

The School Board recognized the student representatives to the RSU 38 Board of Directors: High School representatives Molly Searway and Hannah Woodford; and Middle School representatives Joseph Dupont and Andrea Harmon.

3. Presentations:

a. 4th Annual Instrumental Music Festival Video – Maranacook Music Teacher Adam Scarpone reported the Maranacook Chamber Chorus competed in the Great East Music Festival and earned the Platinum Award. He shared a video from the 4th Annual Instrumental Music Festival held at Maranacook that included 130 students from grades 5 – 12.

b. School Health Leadership Council and 5210 Let’s Go! Program – Health Center Director Rebecca Reynolds and elementary school nurse Jada Clark presented information regarding the 5210 Let’s Go! Program. They spoke about the benefits of having the program at Maranacook. Some of the benefits include having assistance from Healthy Communities to review the District’s current Wellness policy and assistance in developing and implementing an action plan; and a Tool Kit with helpful resources will be provided for each school that will benefit all grade levels. There will also be funds available to help implement the program. The Tool Kit will provide ways to help educate students and their families. The program also includes the funds to install a water bottle filling station at the middle school. There is no cost to the district, and the benefits are many. They requested approval from the Board to sign on to the program.

Question - who would be involved in administering this program? The School Health Leadership Council has members from each of the schools, so a member of the committee would be in charge of implementing the program.

MOTION by Carr, second by Hardy to authorize the Superintendent to sign a letter of commitment for the 2016-2017 school year to participate in the 5210 Let's Go! Program.

Citizen John Harker addressed some of the elements of the 5210 Let's Go! Program and asked that the Board consider including in the contract an assessment for putting together a nutrition curriculum in the schools as well as to consider doing a smarter lunch initiative, and asked to include access to the breakfast in the classroom program. He added that he feels this program misses the mark in reducing sugar and that it does not even mention breakfast in the classroom. Mr. Harker provided additional research information from UConn RUD Center on childhood obesity.

Question - is it worth looking at what Mr. Harker is suggesting? Superintendent Wolfrom responded that the School Health Leadership Council is looking at the very things that Mr. Harker is suggesting.

She asked the Board to reconsider going to fact finding, to sit back at the table, and act as a community and come to a conclusion that will be good for all.

m. Review of 2016-17 ESEA and Proposed 2017-18 ESEA Grant Projects

Curriculum Director Nancy Harriman reported that she is required to make sure the Board and the public know what is being done and what is being planned for next year under the ESEA, Elementary and Secondary Education grant projects. These are Federal funds that are sent to the State and then to local school districts. Funds are distributed among the highest poverty schools first, and the amounts vary from year to year. Readfield Elementary has been a Focus School for the past 4 years, but will not be next year because they no longer qualify for Title I funds.

Ms. Harriman reviewed the information included in the Board packet outlining the projects that were funded this current year as well as reviewed what is being proposed for next year. The grant application isn't available yet, so not only do we not know what the funding will be, but we don't know what will be funded. The Board and public are encouraged to contact Nancy Harriman with questions and/or suggestions for what they would like to see included in the grant for the upcoming year.

Math Coach Sarah Caban spoke about the experiences for the teachers including the Math Leadership Institute which 19 teachers attended last summer; 10 of those 19 volunteered for 70 hours of collaborative study; and 9 of those teachers presented at a national conference on this work. A SurveyMonkey has been sent to staff to determine interest areas for K-12 study groups that will meet on early release days in September, October, and December.

Middle School teacher Aimee Reiter spoke about how this work has benefited staff and students in the classroom.

In 2014, the Board appointed out-going Board member Lynette Johnson to continue her work with the Negotiations Committee, and in 2012, the Board appointed out-going Board members, John Harker, Kerry Casey, Kate Taylor, and Bill Shardlow to continue their work on settling contracts for the Maranacook Area Staff Association.

I believe having Terri Watson continue her work with the Committee will be beneficial in negotiating agreements with both groups in a timely manner.

Rationale for a late bus

The late bus would help us address support for students that need it. Much of the focus of the school board committee was on use by teams and co-curricular groups. A late bus would help the MS work with students who need academic support. We already have a Homework Help Club established on Tuesdays and Wednesdays, but it is ill attended as students need rides. We could push the after school support with kids if we knew they could get home regardless of whether they had a ride. It also gives an option to those kids who know they will not get much done at home. It would help immensely with remediation on common assessments.

Students who do not have families who transport students for afterschool activities are less likely to get the help they need for their academics. Students who participate in extracurricular activities generally benefit from the many opportunities afforded them. Benefits of participating in extracurricular activities included having better grades, having higher standardized test scores and higher educational attainment, attending school more regularly, and having a higher self concept. Participants in out-of-school activities acquire skills such as: collaboration, teamwork and leadership while decreasing the likelihood of alcohol use, drug use and related problem behaviors. Those who participate in out-of-school activities often have higher grade point averages, a decrease in absenteeism, and an increased engagement to the school.

Being in a rural area, students cannot access public transportation or safely walk home. We have families in which driving to the school is impossible due to a lack of a vehicle or the gas needed to transport. Additionally, the free and reduced rates for the middle and high schools have continually increased over seven years. For example, the middle school has gone from 33% in 2009-10 to 39% in 2015-16. The high school has gone from 23.7% in 2009-10 to 35.1% in 2015-16. The late bus would provide students in need of transportation this option in order to participate more in school related activities.

Mt. Vernon - \$68.75

Wayne - \$79.75

Manchester - \$44.83

Total (per day) estimated - \$193.33.

ANNUAL COSTS:

For 34 weeks, two days a week, this would be \$13,146.44

LATE BUS PAYMENT:

100% of the funding would be paid through our GEAR UP grant for 2017-18.

Re: Transfers Between Warrant Article Cost Centers

Statute allows for 5% of a warrant article to be transferred to another warrant article. This statute also requires the school board to approve this transfer. Exact language is below:

“Transfer between budget cost center lines. During the year for which the budget is approved using the cost center summary budget format, the regional school unit board may transfer an amount not exceeding 5% of the total appropriation for any cost center to another cost center or among other cost centers without voter approval.”

Four warrant articles are anticipated to be over expended at the end of this school year. The transfers below are higher than the anticipated overages, but because there is still additional time before the end of the fiscal year I want to make sure there is some cushion for unexpected expenses.

Below is an explanation of the articles that will be over expended:

Facilities/Maintenance will be over expended due to unanticipated building and maintenance issues during the school year.

System Administration will be over expended due to legal fees and reclassification of district employee.

School Administration will be over expended due to contractual obligations for administration personnel changes and needed additional administrative assistant time.

All Other Expenses will be over expended due to reimbursable summer recreation transportation being more than anticipated and additional funds needed to be transferred into Food Service due to food services personnel expenses being greater than anticipated and food service revenue being less than anticipated.
